BACKGROUND

Since 1973, the California League of Conservation Voters (CLCV) has released our annual California Environmental Scorecard which rates the actions of every state legislator and the Governor on environmental action each legislative year. Through the Scorecard, we seek to accurately reflect the impact that lawmakers have on addressing our climate crisis so voters can better understand how often their representatives in the state Legislature are voting for the environment.

We select the most significant environmental bills in each session and track how each legislator votes on each bill. Legislators' scores are shown as a percentage.

As the urgency to address both our climate and political crises heightens, we've revamped the Scorecard this year to reflect our current reality to be a powerful instrument for change. For the first time, CLCV graded legislators, the Governor and the entire state on our progress to make the significant change science tells us we need by 2030 to stop the most catastrophic impacts of climate change. We are looking to go beyond pats on the back and better illuminate who is driving bold change and who is stopping it. This includes scoring California's overall performance, scoring legislators on their committee votes, and rating the Assembly and Senate Democratic and Republican caucuses.

In order to accurately score lawmakers, CLCV calculated individual lawmaker's scores using:

- 1. Their own committee and full house floor votes 95% of score
- 2. Scorecard bills they authored
 - +1 for each pro-environment Scorecard bill authored
 - -1 for each anti-environment Scorecard bill authored
- 3. Their caucus's (Senate or Assembly) average score 3% of score
- 4. The California Score 2% of score



LET'S TAKE A DEEPER LOOK

Our legislators need to measure success on their ability to pass bold climate policy and the entire state's success in taking the action needed right now to protect our future. The new scoring method shines a light on whether the legislature is authoring and moving policy that will significantly move the needle on the climate crisis, who is actually leading by authoring these bills, where are the tough committee votes, and what is the real environmental policy difference between the caucuses. In a recent UC Berkeley poll, 85% of likely voters in California's Democratic primary said climate change was their top priority and 47% said climate change should be the leading priority of the next president – higher than any other issue. We now know that we have ten years – until 2030 - to stop the catastrophic impacts. California lawmakers are equipped with the information, technology and will of the voters. With CLCV's new approach to accountability, we expect to see fast and rapid bold transformative action. Legislators have a mandate to lead now.

CALIFORNIA GOVERNOR - Gavin Newsom

Governor Newsom's first year in office started out with a focus on Safe and Affordable Drinking Water, a priority issue for CLCV. This action will improve the health and wellness of over one million Californians across the state. The Governor also championed some important proenvironment executive actions during his first year. Newsom's score leaves room for improvement for visionary leadership on the role that government must place in this climate crisis. We need large scale change that is integrated across issue areas, and we are relying on our Governor and his team for this leadership. Significant disappointments in the

Governor'sperformance this year includes his decision to veto SB 1 and SB 127, and his score reflects California's overall lack of bold action by including five percent of California's overall score. The first year in a new job is always tough, building a team, learning the job and how to work with the legislature were big focuses in 2019, and we are eager to work with the Governor and Administration in 2020 to create a real vision for action by 2030.

Climate Action Caucus

Members of the *California Environmental Scorecard's* Climate Action Caucus have gone above and beyond as environmental champions to fight for bold climate policy and are leading the effort to address the climate crisis.



CLIMATE QUEEN: Assemblymember Monique Limón

Assemblymember Limón is not afraid of a tough fight to protect the environment. In 2019, she championed AB 1057, holding the oil industry accountable for the clean-up costs associated with extraction and focuses the mission of the overseeing agency regulating oil and gas to protecting public health and environmental protection, not oil extraction. Limon's legislation has led to increased oversight and accountability of oil and gas as California moves away from fossil fuels.



CLEAN AIR AMBASSADOR: Senator Connie Leyva

Senator Leyva has increased her Environmental Score every year and has authored several bills in her time in the legislature that protect children and front-line communities from air pollution and toxic chemicals. This year she authored two Scorecard bills, SB 210 and SB 574.



WATER CHAMPION: Senator Bill Monning

Championed SB 200 to establish the Safe and Affordable Drinking Water Fund, one of CLCV's top priority bills of 2019, and led the effort to deliver on the promise of clean and safe drinking water for every Californian.



FRESHMAN OF THE YEAR: Assemblymember Luz Rivas

Assemblymember Luz Rivas vastly changed the voting record for Assembly District 39 and has maintained an open dialogue with CLCV on environmental priorities. She voted favorably on every CLCV top priority bill of 2019, coauthored SB 307, and authored a bill to establish the School Pavement to Parks Grant Program to convert asphalt playgrounds to park with green space.



ANTI OIL ALL-STAR: Assemblymember AI Muratsuchi

Assemblymember Muratsuchi has been a consistent champion for accountability of oil and gas industry each year he has been in office. In 2019, he introduced two oil and gas focused bills AB 345, a Scorecard bill, and AB 342, which would prohibit new oil drilling on public lands in California.

Polluter Caucus

Members of the polluter caucus have an adverse impact on the environment through either hindering bold climate policy, authoring anti-environmental bills, or otherwise rolling back our commitment as a state to be a global leader on climate action. These legislators do not represent their Assembly or Senate caucus' stated commitment to addressing and prioritizing climate action.



Assemblymember Jim Frazier

Assemblymember Frazier has chaired the Assembly Transportation committee since 2015, and during his time as chair has failed to pass critical environmental bills through his committee. It's concerning that the chair of the committee with jurisdiction over transportation policy, the area of climate policy with the most need for improvement if California is to meet our 2030 climate goals, has a failing 44 percent Environmental Score.



Senator Anna Caballero

Senator Caballero has the lowest score of all Senate Democrat Caucus members and authored three anti-environment Scorecard bills, SB 25, SB 669, and SB 386.



Assemblymember Rudy Salas

Assemblymember Salas is the lowest scoring member of the Assembly Democratic Caucus, with four Assembly Republican Caucus members with scores higher than his 26 percent. This year, he authored one antienvironment Scorecard bill, AB 1299, which attempted to create a special exemption for toxic air emissions that would've harmed the health of the local community.



Assemblymember Blanca Rubio

Assemblymember Blanca Rubio's environmental score is on a downward trend, with a double digit drop in her score every year. From an 83 percent Environmental Score in 2017, to a 67 percent in 2016, and now a 51 percent in 2019.



Senator Steven Glazer

Senator Glazer saw a 20 percent drop in his score from previous years and has co-authored anti-environment bills. The backwards trend in his Environmental Score is not representative of the constituents of Senate District 7, which is a community with strong environmental support. Senator Glazer's relationship his colleagues in stalling, holding out, or weakening environmental policies has had a significant impact on the state's ability to address our climate crisis.

Let's tell our lawmakers we want California to get an "A" on climate action in 2020

There are times when legislators fight hard behind the scenes to stop damaging and hazardous policy, or fight for bold and important policy. Similarly, there are times when legislators aligned with polluters work behind the scenes to weaken or kill the strongest environmental bills before they can even get a vote. Looking at voting records alone doesn't tell that side of the story. This is where you come in. When the people of California make their voices heard by calling, writing and standing up to tell elected leaders their values and positions, our policies better reflect our great state. Voting is critical to our movement.
